Where The Wild Things Are

We're all familiar with the many birds and squirrels that share our common areas each day. But are you aware of the many other wild animals that are living nearby and visiting Fairlington on a regular basis? If not, come for a walk with me and I'll explain.

Ever since I treated myself to a Fitbit on January 1, 2015, I have been walking 10,000 steps or more every-day. Many of those steps are taken in the Glen and throughout Fairlington. I suppose I could write an entire column about some of the "observations" I've made while walking through our neighborhood, and maybe I will another time. But for now, let's concentrate on animals.

One night in March I was returning home from a long walk and was approaching Court 11 on S. 36th Street. There's a community trash can that sits adjacent to the sidewalk in front of Court 11, and as I got near it looked like there was a bag or something sitting on top of that can. But the closer I got the sooner I realized that the something on top of the can began to move. That something was none other than a raccoon. That little guy had his face buried deep in the trash can as he searched for treasures. As he sensed me coming nearby he popped his head out and looked around. Then he jumped to the ground and made a quick dash for the nearby sewer. He scurried underground and made his safe getaway before I could even think about grabbing my phone to take a picture.

In addition to that raccoon, I've seen a fox or two running around. I think they are just as scared of us as we are scared of them. I've also seen either a Cooper's hawk or a sharp-skinned hawk both in the air, resting in the trees, and preying on smaller critters. And let's not forget about rats and mice. They're out there too.

So if you ever wonder why we don't allow trash to be put out the night before pick up, just remember that one good reason is the many wild animals out there that would just love the chance to rip open our trash bags, feast on our scraps, and subsequently leave a mess behind. You may see trash out early in the Meadows or the Arbor, but remember that they have different rules. In the Glen, let's all remember to put our trash out only on the morning of pick up. Please don't feed the animals.

B Building News

On March 8, the Board approved a contract with Heart National Corporation in the amount of \$2461 for professional cleaning of the hallway carpeting/stairs in all 23 B Buildings in the Glen. The work will be scheduled for late May.

In addition, the co-owners and residents of seven B Buildings were notified to remove stored items from the basement areas. Our Bylaws and Handbook are very clear on the matter. According to the Handbook, "only bicycles, tricycles, and baby carriages are allowed in the common hallways and basement, and only if all residents in the building agree and the items do not block access to exits. Some limit on the number of such items may be imposed. Nothing is to be affixed to hallway walls."

Co-owners and residents in these buildings have until April 29, 2016 to remove their stored items such as furniture, carpet, tires, boxes, ladders, etc.

Professional Landscapers Beautify The Glen

Maintaining common areas in the Glen is one of the Board's most basic responsibilities. To fulfill that responsibility, the Board has contracted with Environmental Enhancements (EE) to be our professional landscaping company. Fred Peratt and his staff at EE have been doing a terrific job in our community for several years and have been working alongside the Glen's Landscape Committee to help beautify our wonderful neighborhood.



On page 4 of this month's *Glen Echo* you'll find a color-coded chart that Fred provided for us to detail EE's services to the Glen for 2016. We've all seen the crews in our courts and heard the whirl of their mowers and leaf blowers, but if you'll spend a few moments glancing at the chart you'll have a better appreciation for what EE provides to us on an annual basis.

It takes more than a green thumb to maintain attractive and functional landscaping. Our contractor employs a professional staff and trained labor crews to help keep the Glen and its curb appeal looking great.

Landscaping is very important to the community's quality of life, its image, its value, and even its resale value. In fact, it's a long-term investment in our community. Maintaining it can be expensive, but it's well worth it.

Spring Clean Up Scheduled; Volunteers Needed



After a winter that included an unusually warm Christmas and a blizzard that dumped 24 inches of snow on us in January, spring is now here!



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Water Usage Continues Downward Trend



Water usage in Fairlington Glen continues its gradual downward trend, dropping from over 20 million gallons per year 25 years ago to less than 14 million gallons today. Conservation practices by Glen co-owners and residents installing water-saving appliances and toilets has been the major contributor to this excellent record. Our lowered usage helped moderate our shared water bill as Arlington County water and sewer rates increased dramatically to pay for the water treatment facility on Glebe Road.

To get those 14 million gallons down to something more understandable, we have converted a recent quarter to average gallons used **per unit per day**. The Glen average is 107 gallons per unit per day. Individual courts in the most recently billed quarter ranged from a low of 55 gallons in Court 14 to a high of 130 gallons in Courts 4, 6, and 8 (plus half of Court 7).

Even with usage decreasing, our water bill is still projected to be almost 23% of our total operating expenses in 2016. You can help to save water by taking some of the following steps:

- Check for slow leaks or drips, and fix them
- Run dishwashers and clothes washers with full loads
- Install a low-flow aerator on your showerhead and sink
 - Turn off tap water while brushing teeth or shaving
- Keep a container of water in the refrigerator for cold drinks
 - Water plants and trees early in the morning

Thank you for your contributions to keeping our water usage down. We appreciate it!


3rd Annual Fairlington 5K

The 3rd Annual Fairlington 5K Run & Walk will be Saturday, April 23 at 8:30am. The event begins and ends at Abingdon Elementary School.

This family-friendly event will be hosted by Abingdon Elementary School and the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) to promote health and physical fitness AND to bring the community together for a good cause, which is to raise money and awareness for Ellie McGinn and Abingdon Elementary.

Ellie is a second-grade student at Abingdon and a Fairlington Arbor resident who was diagnosed with a rare degenerative brain and spinal cord mitochondrial disease for which there is no known cure. Last year, there were more than 600 participants who helped raise \$22,000 for the Cure

For Ellie Fund and for Abingdon Elementary.

Plus, a silent auction on Friday, April 15 at the Fairlington Villages Community Center, 3005 S. Abingdon Street, will help to raise funds. Some items to be auctioned off include Washington Nationals tickets, restaurant gift cards, gift baskets, and more

Take part in the 1-Mile Fun Run or 5K (3.1 miles) through Fairlington. Part of the 5K course even comes through the Glen. Registration rates are \$35 for adults, \$20 for kids 10-16, \$15 for children 6 to 9, and FREE for children under 5.

Packet pick up will be Thursday, April 21 and Friday, April 22 from 3:00 to 6:00pm at Abingdon Elementary School at 3035 S. Abingdon Street.

Please note that during the event many streets throughout Fairlington will be closed to traffic for 60 to 90 minutes. These are rolling road closures, so after the race goes by, that portion of the road will open back up. Road closures begin at 8:00am and pending delays should be open by 9:30am. Part of this race comes through the Glen, so plan accordingly!

Board Denies Access To County

At the Board's March 8 monthly meeting, the Board voted unanimously to once again deny Arlington County access to our courtyard parking lots for the purpose of discovering and assessing all vehicles that may be subject to personal property tax, including vehicles not registered in Virginia.

The County also asked the Glen to provide a list of all co-owners & tenants by address along with the make, model, year, and license plate number (and state) for each vehicle associated with each unit. Because the Glen does not maintain such a list, nothing can be provided to the County.



Please note that the streets throughout Fairlington are owned and maintained by Arlington County; therefore, the County has every right to check all vehicles parked on the street for updated personal property tax stickers, updated state inspection stickers, and updated license plates.

Slow Down in Alexandria To Avoid Fines



On March 25, 2016 new speed limits went into effect on two major thoroughfares in the City of Alexandria. The City warns that Alexandria Police will be out in force to enforce the slower speed limit.

The speed limit changes, from 35 to 25 mph, affect Seminary Road between I-395 & Quaker Lane AND Quaker Lane between Duke Street & Braddock Road.

The changes were recommended by the Alexandria Traffic and Parking Board in February and later approved by the city manager. The changes were initiated after neighbors raised concerns about pedestrian and vehicular safety.

Common Areas - Please Take Note

Now that spring is here, it's worth reminding all residents that personal household items like toys, bikes, strollers, and lawn furniture should not be stored on the common areas in front of or near our buildings or on front stoops. Instead, please stores these items within your unit or on your patio area.

Article IV, Section 4 of our Bylaws deals with the use of General Common Elements. It states "A co-owner shall not place or cause to be placed in the general common elements any objects or any kind which tend to obstruct the reasonable uses of the General Common Elements by any other co-owner."

While it's tempting to leave personal items out, it's not appreciated. Please do your part to maintain our beautiful landscape by keeping personal items inside.

And one final note, please do not climb our trees. This goes for both children and adults. Trees are an important part of the beauty of Fairlington Glen. Climbing of trees can cause injuries both to the trees and the climbers.



THE GLEN 10 10 Q's & A's with

Dick Kennedy & Carol Goodloe

Maybe you've seen their faces, but do you know their stories? Get to know your neighbors in the Glen each month through this feature we call the Glen 10.

- 1. You are a member of an elite group of original Fairlington co-owners. What year did you purchase your first Fairlington home and in what village did you reside? Dick: "1974 the Meadows."
- 2. What attracted you and your family to Fairlington? Dick: "I came to Washington in September 1960 to work in the Bureau of International Economics of the Department of Commerce and moved to the Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Economic Research Service (ERS) in 1964. The attraction for me began long before I met Carol and before the Fairlington garden apartments converted to condominiums. Fairlington has always been a great place to live, offering a beautiful setting with trees, birds, and pesky squirrels (raccoons arrived later); a short commute; and the conveniences of Bradlee. And after conversion to condos it became a really good investment opportunity. But I had other motivations, having begun a long-term relationship with a cat named Harry that became relevant to my future move to Fairlington. When my DC apartment announced it would start enforcing its anti-cat policy, it was then I first considered renting an apartment in Fairlington. But there was an impossibly long waiting list.

In 1970 I began a two-year USDA assignment to Virginia State College in Petersburg, VA. Returning, I began again looking at Fairlington; there were affordable vacancies, but the catch was that they came with month-to-month leases. So I moved into a drafty old apartment in Arlington just off Columbia Pike. But when conversion to condos got underway in 1973 in the Meadows, former tenants having moved out, I began reconnoitering the work site, crawling into the basements that formerly extended the length of a row of buildings and contained storage areas and public laundry sinks. Conversion transformed these spaces into private rec rooms, studies, and bathrooms/laundries for the living quarters above. Often using a shaky ladder to get up into them, I got a favorable impression of how the renovations were progressing and put down a deposit for an Edgewood in the Meadows, the second tract to be renovated, and moved in 1974. Then I met Carol."

Carol: "I came to DC looking for a job in 1978 and ended up working in the same ERS division as Dick. Assigned to work on a report for Congress on global food production and needs that Dick had previously coordinated, he offered help with esoteric questions such as how to combine differing northern and southern hemisphere crop and trade seasons necessary to understand the world picture. (You don't want to know!) He invited me to sail as his crew, ordering me about in racing a 14-foot sailing dinghy. I retaliated by beating him regularly at tennis and wearing him out bicycling. On such terms of equality, we were married in November 1981. Yes, Harry the cat had entered the great beyond a couple years earlier. I too had become a Fairlingtonian."

- 3. What prompted the move to the Glen? What year did you buy and move to Court 10? What model do you own? Carol: "Our first son, Clark, was born in January 1987. The little alcove formed by the eaves of the one-bedroom Edgewood in which his crib sat seemed a bit inadequate for the long run. We had no interest in long commutes to DC, and I was a dedicated bike commuter and car pools were easy to form. So we ended up moving two blocks down the street to the Glen. We sealed the deal on our Dominion on a Sunday in 1987, beating out the competition who were all watching the Redskins on TV losing in the NFL playoffs."
- **4.** Having been such long-time Fairlington residents, what do you think has changed the most over the years here in our community? Dick: "The trees are bigger and our friends are older. There are probably more renters than co-owners now compared with when we first bought."
- **5.** And over the course of the past 40 years, what aspects of our neighborhood have seemed to remain constant? Dick: "Unchanged is how one can still meet all sorts of people from all over the country as well as some born in other countries. We long-term residents may grouse a bit about tight storage space and some bad plumbing, but we love our friendly neighbors and close-knit community. That is what is most unchanged."
- **6. Please tell us more about your family and where you are originally from.** Carol: "Dick is from Cleveland, OH, and I'm from Huntsville, AL. So in regional terms you might say we are a 'mixed' couple. Shortly after we married, we acquired two kittens from the Arlington animal shelter, naming them Mason and Dixie, a reflection of both our love of animals and our regional loyalties. We met at USDA, and we both were economists dealing with and sometimes arguing about international trade and domestic policy issues."
- 7. Why do you think our neighborhood has been such a wonderful place to raise a family? Dick: "The combination of the playgrounds, pool, and tennis courts, plus great neighbors and our wonderful neighborhood school, Abingdon, make Fairlington hard to beat. The South Fairlington babysitting co-op was also a life saver. And it's nice to have neighbors who keep an eye out for your kids."

- 8. You have two sons (Clark and Hank) and a daughter-in-law (Rebecca) who both attended Abingdon Elementary School in the 1990's, and now your grandson Brady is a Kindergartener at Abingdon. Why do you think Clark & Rebecca, who of course live nearby, chose Abingdon for their son? Carol: "Hank (our second son) came along in 1989, and both boys attended pre-school at the Fairlington Community Center. Both enjoyed opportunities for sports in the area. Clark with baseball and Hank with soccer and tennis. Both they and Becki all had great memories of Abingdon, and several of their teachers are still there. Brady went to pre-K at Abingdon, and Becki and Clark never hesitated to keep him there when it came time for him to start Kindergarten. Abingdon has a good PTA with strong participation. We were both (PTA) officers back in our younger days."
- **9.** You must have plenty of great memories of life in the Glen. Can you share a story about one of those fondest moments? Carol: "Perhaps not fond, but here is a memorable moment. In 1992, Dick had emergency heart surgery and was in the hospital for over a month. The kids were only 3 and 5, and my job was especially hectic at that time. Once word got out about Dick's situation, friends and neighbors showed up with offers of food and babysitting and moral support. I may not have survived without such help. When I gave everyone a heartfelt thanks, a neighbor remarked that Fairlington is a great place to have a crisis."

10. What advice can you give to a new co-owner or resident who is just beginning their life in the Glen? Carol: "Pay some attention to the great communication channels that the Glen offers (monthly newsletter, Glen Alerts, the FCA Facebook page, etc.). Volunteer even a little and you will learn a lot! That will make your life easier and more enjoyable. And enjoy the pool! It's a great place to hang out and chat with neighbors."

Arlington E-CARE Spring Recycling



Arlington County's Spring Environmental Collection and Recycling Event (E-CARE) is set for Saturday, April 16 from 8:30am to 3:00pm - rain or shine. County residents can safely dispose of hazardous household materials (HHM's) and also recycle bikes, small metal items, shoes, clothing, and more all in one convenient location.

E-CARE will be at Thomas Jefferson Middle School at 125 S. Old Glebe Road (one block east of Glebe and one block south of Route 50). Please bring your ID in order to verify County residency.

Dispose of old or expired HHM's such as small metal items (pots & pans, tools, venetian blinds, and small appliances), electronics (computers,

printers, keyboards, scanners, copiers, and cell phones), and TV's & computer monitors. There is a \$15 fee for each computer monitor and a \$20 fee for each TV containing cathode ray tubes. However, LED or LCD monitors and TV's are free. All fees are payable by cash or checks only.

Drop off household devices containing Mercury, such as thermostats, thermometers, and compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFL's).

Art For Humanity will collect gently used but functional clothing, shoes, microwaves, rugs, and kitchen items. Plus, linens are needed - sheets, blankets, bedspreads, and towels. Your donated items to Art For Humanity will be sent to help end poverty in Honduras.

You can also donate eyeglasses and durable medical equipment like hearing aids, wheelchairs, walkers, canes, crutches, braces, and strollers. These items will be cleaned and sent to overseas clinics run by volunteers.

Bikes For The World will accept serviceable and repairable bicycles to be sent to countries where they are needed for basic transportation. A \$10 donation per bike is requested to help with shipping costs.

Please note that business or commercial wastes will not be accepted.
