Board Officers Elect To Switch Positions

At their monthly meeting on March 13, 2018, the Fairlington Glen Board of Directors passed a motion allowing Board President Bill Layer and Board Vice President Thora Stanwood to reassign each office. That makes Stanwood the Board's new president and Layer the Board's new vice president effective immediately.

Last year when I left the Board, I encouraged the remaining Board members to consider stepping up and assuming the duties of the presidency. I told them that it would be unfair to think that a brand new member who had never served should take over the leadership role without any prior Board experience. However, at that time none expressed interest in becoming the next president. So in November, after Layer was elected to his first term on the Board, the Board members chose him to be president.

Fast forward to the new year and there has been a change of heart. After discussion among the five Board members and Candace Lewis, our property manager with Cardinal Management Group, Inc., the decision to switch positions was introduced as a motion and passed.

Please join me in congratulating Stanwood and Layer.

Board To Discuss Future Of Paddle Ball Court

In other Board news, the Board is in the initial stage of considering removal of the unused paddle ball court that sits between courts 6 and 7. The court has been deteriorating for years and has become an eyesore, drawing complaints from nearby residents.

New Court Signs To Be Installed



At the Board's November 14, 2017 meeting, a contract was approved in the amount of \$22,884 (a reserve account expenditure) with Banana Banner of Alexandria, VA for brand new court signs.

And after a lengthy production process, those signs are scheduled to be installed this month, weather permitting. The new signs (see the example to the left) are made of a foam material that resembles wood. Each sign will be mounted with two posts and will resemble those in the Arbor.

It is no secret that the Glen's existing court signs, found at the entrance to each courtyard parking lot, have seen better days. The new signs will be a welcome improvement!

Aluminum Signs Posted Throughout The Glen

On February 13, 2018, the Board approved a contract in the amount of \$466.40 with Banana Banner of Alexandria for a series of 16 aluminum signs. Many of those signs were installed last month by our onsite crew, Nelson Ordoñez and María Castro.

One is a replacement for a sign at the entrance to the Court 12/13 alley that contained a misspelling. One is a new sign that details rules for the playground. It is important to note that the children's ages detailed on the tot lot sign are the ages recommended to us by the equipment's manufacturer. Other signs, such as those to the right, are posted throughout our common areas. And four signs have been posted on the

fence around the pool warning folks not to climb the pool fences or to trespass.





The two office parking spaces located in the Court 11 parking lot are reserved at all hours and all days of the week for our maintenance staff and authorized office vehicles only. At no time shall these spaces be occupied by residents, their quests, or their contractors.

Contrary to opinion, no unit in Court 11 lost a space as a result of these two spaces being reserved for Glen staff. Each unit in the Glen is given one reserved space. Additional vehicles, plus those belonging to visitors and contractors, should park on the street.

Please do not park your vehicle in either of these Court 11 spaces at any time. Violators are subject to towing at the expense of the car's owner.

Thank you for your attention to this matter.

Professional Landscapers Beautify The Glen

Maintaining common areas in the Glen is one of the Board's most basic responsibilities. To fulfill that responsibility, the Board has contracted with Environmental Enhancements (EE) to be our professional landscaping company. Fred Peratt and his staff have a three-year contract with the Glen to help beautify our wonderful neighborhood.



On page 4 of this month's *Glen Echo* you'll find a chart that Fred provided for us to detail EE's services to the Glen for 2018. We've all seen the landscape crews in our courts and heard the whirl of their mowers and leaf blowers, but if you'll spend a few moments glancing at the chart you'll have a better appreciation for what EE provides to us on an annual basis.

It takes more than a green thumb to maintain attractive and functional landscaping. Our contractor employs a professional staff and trained labor crews to help keep the Glen and its curb appeal looking great.

Landscaping is very important to the community's quality of life, its image, its value, and even its resale value. In fact, it's a long-term investment in our community. Maintaining it can be expensive, but it's well worth it.

Volunteers Needed For Spring Clean Up



After a winter that included frigid temperatures, minimal snow, and a massive windstorm, spring is now here - although it's been slow to arrive.

Our landscapers have already been out to clean up leftover leaves and downed twigs/branches. Crews from EE will be laying down mulch throughout the Glen early this month. And now

it's our turn to spend two or three hours as a group to help the Glen look its spring best.

The Board and the Landscape Committee are once again teaming up for another **Spring Clean Up Day on Saturday, April 14**. Volunteers are needed to spend some time cleaning up our perimeter areas along the interior and exterior fence lines on King Street and Quaker Lane and helping to remove ivy from many of our common area trees, especially along the perimeter. Both adults and children are welcome to join. This is a great opportunity to meet your fellow neighbors, make new friends, and pitch in to help make the Glen's landscape even more beautiful.



Wood Repairs Begin; Painting Coming Soon

Kolas Contracting of Alexandria has begun carpentry repairs for the year in Courts 1-4. The Board approved this work, in the amount of \$24,769, at its December 12, 2017 meeting.

Meantime, on March 13, 2018 the Board approved a contract with Kolas in the amount of \$72,900 for exterior painting in Courts 5-8. At this time, there is no start date given for the painting.

The Glen paints the exteriors of our buildings on a four-year cycle. Here's a look at that cycle for the next four years:



- Courts 5-8 / 2018
- Courts 9-12 / 2019
- Courts 13-16 / 2020
- Courts 1-4 / 2021

Most Arlington Crime Rates Decline

Speaking at the March 14, 2018 meeting of the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA), Captain Adrienne Quigley, Third District Commander of the Arlington County Police Department (ACPD), said there's been a 32% reduction in reported crime incidents since 2016.

Thefts of airbags are down, but Captain Quigley reported that thieves seem to now be targeting catalytic converters and tires/rims on Hondas and Acuras. Thieves are breaking car windows to access the glove box where most people are storing their wheel locks, and that's how they can quickly remove tires and rims. Quigley suggested moving wheel locks to another location.

Domestic assault and batteries have been on the rise. These are situations between parents/children, spouses/spouses, and domestic partners/domestic partners.

Quigley said there are still traffic and parking issues within Fairlington, and the ACPD will continue doing traffic enforcement in our neighborhood. Be aware of where you're parking on the street and do not park in spaces specifically marked for no parking. Also, be sure to stay within the posted speed limit and come to a complete stop at all stop signs.

Quigley indicated that gang-related activity seems to be getting closer to Arlington, with incidents being reported recently near Arlington's borders with the City of Alexandria and Fairfax County. She also said the nationwide Opioid epidemic is a problem in Arlington as fatalities and incidents, in her words, are "very prevalent here."

Finally, there was no update on the Shirlington rape case. Quigley reported that no arrests have been made yet and the police do not have a suspect named. The ACPD is still working on the case.

Details On Your Condo Fee



A unit owner's annual contribution (assessment) to the expenses of the condominium is in proportion to his/her undivided interest in the common elements. A unit's proportionate interest is established in the Glen's Master Deed, which has been posted on our website. Your fee is the total condominium assessment multiplied by your proportionate interest.

In addition to an annual assessment, special assessments may be levied by the Board if necessary. However, in the 42-year history of Fairlington Glen there has never been a special assessment.

Regular monthly assessments are due on or before the first day of each month. You may pay your monthly fee by automatic debit from your bank account, by bill pay, or by mailing your payment and coupon to the designated address. We encourage you to arrange for direct debit because this saves the association the expense of printing and mailing coupon books. It also saves you the need to remember to send in your monthly amount due. For a look at the 2018 assessment schedule and more info on how to pay your monthly fee, check out the January 2018 *Glen Echo*.

A late charge is assessed if the assessment is received after the 10th of the month. If your fee is not paid by the 10th of the month you will receive a letter noting your lateness and stating that a late fee is also due. If your account is more than a month in arrears you will receive a notice requesting payment within 10 days. Beyond that, your account will be referred to our attorney for collection. The Board may authorize the attorney to require that you immediately pay all monthly installments for the remainder of the fiscal year.

Wind Storm Downs Tree, Knocks Power Out

For many in Fairlington, the lights went out on Friday, March 2 as a massive wind storm rocked our region with winds gusting up to 60 and 70 miles per hour throughout the day. Thankfully, the damage to our community was minimal. While many branches came down, only one common area tree was uprooted in Court 8. The Board approved an expenditure of \$1830 with G&V Tree and Landscaping to remove the downed tree and other storm debris.

Should your electricity go out (for whatever reason), please report the outage to Dominion Energy Virginia. Simply follow the information provided at the right and make sure the utility knows your home is in the dark. Don't assume that a neighbor has already done this for you OR that Dominion is aware of your outage.



Weather is the leading cause of power outages:

- Lightning often strikes transmission line towers, utility poles, wires, transformers and other electrical equipment, causing severe damage and loss of power.
- Strong winds can blow tree limbs or entire trees onto power lines. Severe winds, such as from hurricanes and tornadoes, can destroy large areas of lines and utility poles.
- Weight from ice, snow, and tree limbs can cause power lines to break.
- Water (heavy rain, floods, etc.) can trigger power outages by damaging overhead and underground electrical equipment.

It's Tax Time...Again

Tax season is here, and the deadline to file your federal and/or state income tax returns is less than a month away.

Please be aware that the filing deadline to submit your 2017 federal tax returns is Tuesday, April 17 this year rather than the traditional April 15 deadline. April 15 falls on a Sunday this year, and that normally means that the filing deadline is moved to the following Monday. However, Emancipation Day is observed on April 16 in the District of Columbia which pushes the nation's filing deadline to Tuesday, April 17. Under the tax law, legal holidays in DC affect the filing deadline nationwide.



The deadline to file Virginia tax returns is Monday, May 1.

Fairlington Farmers Market Reopens Next Month





5th Annual Fairlington 5K Is April 28

Get ready for the 5th Annual Fairlington 5K Run & Walk on **Saturday, April 28**. This family-friendly event will be hosted by Abingdon Elementary School and the Fairlington Citizens Association (FCA) to promote health & physical fitness AND to bring the community together for great causes - to raise money and awareness for Ellie McGinn, Abingdon's physical education program, and Abingdon's literacy program.

Ellie is a 9-year-old Fairlington Arbor resident who was diagnosed in 2011 with a rare degenerative brain and spinal cord mitochondrial disease for which there is no known cure. The disease slowly robs children of their ability to walk, then stand, and then to coordinate all motor skills.

Participants can take part in the 1K Walk & Fun Run or 5K (3.1 miles) through Fairlington. Part of the 5K course even comes through the Glen. If you can't participate, perhaps you can help cheer on the runners and walkers.

Registration rates for the 5K will be \$35 for adults, \$20 for kids 6-16, and FREE for children 5 and under. Costs for the 1K Walk & Fun Run are \$15 for adults, \$12 for kids 6-16, and FREE for children 5 and under. Participants will receive t-shirts. And dogs and strollers are welcome.

Packet pick up will be Friday, April 27 from 3:00 to 6:00pm at Abingdon Elementary School at 3035 S. Abingdon Street.

Please note that during the event many streets throughout Fairlington will be closed to traffic for up to 60 to 90 minutes. These are rolling road closures, so after the race goes by, that portion of the road will open back up. Road closures begin at 8:00am and, pending delays, should be open by 9:30am. Part of this race comes through the Glen, so plan accordingly!

Please Note Glen "Working Hours"



Residents shall not make or permit any noises that will disturb or annoy the occupants of any units OR do or permit anything to be done that will interfere with the rights, comfort, or convenience of other residents, particularly during the nighttime and early morning hours from 10:00pm to 8:00am.

Construction renovation by you or a hired contractor is prohibited generally from 6:00pm to 8:00am. Please make your contractor aware of our "working hours." And please alert your neighbors when renovation contractors will be working. If your contractor is going to work on a Saturday or Sunday, please be considerate to your neighbors and allow for a later starting time.

Recyclables Must Be Empty And Clean

It is very important that ALL recyclable materials be cleaned and rinsed before being dropped into the bins for our weekly recycling.

After recyclables are picked up here in the Glen, they get sorted by material type, compressed into bales, and then sold as raw material to end-users and manufacturers for use in new products and packaging. One of the keys to the cost of recyclables is quality and cleanliness.



Food and liquids are contaminants, and recyclables that have too much contamination lose value or may end up causing the entire batch to be rejected. Rejected recyclables are disposed of as trash, so in effect by leaving your recycling items contaminated you are defeating the purpose.

Please make sure food and beverage containers are empty and rinsed out before placing these containers in the bins.

Keep food-contaminated paper, such as napkins and paper towels, out of the recycling. Instead, place these items in your regular household trash. Do not recycle pizza boxes because they generally contain grease and food.

County Begins Online Payment For Building Permits



Arlington County has unveiled its new online payment system for building permits. With the new ePlan Review Online payment feature, applicants can pay online for selected commercial and residential building permits. Thanks to this new process, cus-ARLINGTON tomers will no longer need to visit County offices in person to make a payment or pick up approved permits and plans.

The ePlan Review system will allow customers to complete their entire transaction (apply for a permit, pay fees with a credit card or e-check, and print the approved permits) online 24/7 from anywhere.
