Pool Opening Likely Delayed; Lifeguards Needed

The Glen's Pool Committee has been working with our pool contractor, Atlantic Pool Service, to get ready for the 2020 pool season. However, given the COVID-19 pandemic, it is very likely that our pool opening will be delayed. How long? That remains to be seen. The final call regarding when the pool opens and requirements for opening will be determined by the Virginia Department of Health and subsequently Arlington County, which will need to inspect the pool and issue a permit to operate.

Arlington County is unable to conduct inspections until the stay at home order is lifted by the governor. The order is currently extended through June 10.

In the meantime, Atlantic has begun the normal preparations to get the pool ready for opening. If you happen to see our contractor draining the pool, cleaning the surface, and filling the pool, just do not assume that the pool is opening on time. Our contractor is simply taking all of the necessary steps now to get the pool ready so that if and when we are cleared to open, the pool will be prepared pending the ability to open.

But this still leaves us in a bit of a pickle. You see, there is no guarantee that our team of international guards will be able to travel to the U.S. this summer. Without lifeguards, the pool cannot operate. So as a result, Atlantic is looking to hire additional local lifeguards immediately. These jobs are not only open to teens, but adults too. Please spread the word in the Glen and among your friends and neighbors in Arlington, Alexandria, and throughout Northern Virginia. Note that lifeguard certifications are not required at time of hire. Those interested should call Atlantic Pool Service at 703-941-1000 or email atlanticpoolinc@aol.com.

2020 recreation passes will not be distributed until a definite pool schedule and updated pool rules/operating procedures have been established.

While we're all excited to get out of the house and enjoy the upcoming summer season at the pool, we won't be able to do so until all of these matters are resolved. Thanks for your patience and understanding.

Latest News From The Board



The Fairlington Glen Board of Directors cancelled their monthly meeting, which was scheduled for Tuesday, April 14, 2020, due to: 1) the Fairlington Community Center was closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic and 2) the Commonwealth of Virginia stay-at-home ordinance which was issued by Governor Ralph Northam thru June 10, 2020.

The Board voted, via email, on the following items:

1. To approve the site manager's job description and agreed to have it attached to the minutes of the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.
2. To allow the Board President to sign the painting bid from Kolas Contracting in the amount of \$89,016, after the written incorporation of the Glen's specifications have been added to the contract. This contract is for exterior painting in Courts 13-16 this year.
3. To request that the management agent contact Whiteford Taylor & Preston, the Glen's environmental counsel, about the ongoing environmental issues as previously outlined in a meeting.
4. To approve a contract with Atlantic Pool Service, Inc. in the amount of \$2,567 for caulking and pool repairs.
5. To approve the Board's March meeting minutes as included in the virtual Board meeting packet.

Please note that these items will be duly ratified at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.

The next monthly Board meeting is scheduled on Tuesday, May 12, 2020, at 6:30pm at the Fairlington Community Center, located at 3308 S. Stafford Street. However, with the Community Center closed as part of Arlington County's emergency response to the COVID-19 outbreak, the Board is working with our management agent on a plan to hold the meeting virtually. Details will be announced as we get closer to the meeting date.



Common Elements Use Agreement

Before you plan an outdoor party or get ready to move, please remember to read up on an important resolution that began nearly six years ago.

Policy Resolution 14-01 went into effect on July 15, 2014 after it was adopted by the Board for the use of common elements.

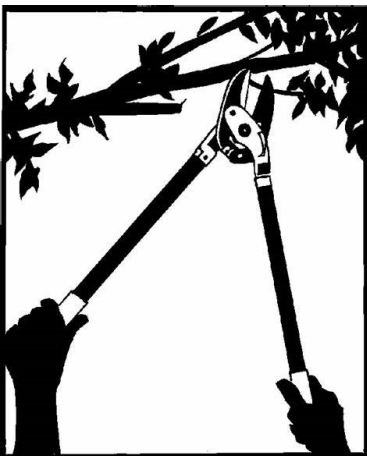
Specifically, this resolution deals with the temporary placement of items on the common elements including recreational items such as moon bounces or party tents (either the 10x10 variety OR a rental unit). If you are planning a child's birthday party, a graduation party, or other gathering then you'll want to consult the resolution and seek permission to use the common areas for those purposes.



In addition, several residents have sought permission to temporarily place a POD in their parking space while they've been in the process of moving. Again, you must have formal approval to do this. Simply fill out the Common Elements Use Agreement and submit it to the Board for approval.

Overgrown Patios Need Your Attention



When was the last time you did some trimming and pruning of your patio trees, shrubs, and vines? Let's face it, it may have been a long while. So now is the perfect time to get it done.

You definitely want to enjoy some time outside on your patio this spring and summer, but maybe you didn't realize that your patio is a bit overgrown. Your trees and shrubs may even be encroaching into your neighbors' patios. It's time for a trimming.

Please keep in mind that you are responsible for properly disposing of any yard waste. Cut the tree branches into smaller pieces and place with other trimmings inside a garbage bag. Bags can be left out with your regular household trash for pick up.

Maybe you didn't realize your fence is covered in vines.

The replacement of our aging patio fences will be a huge expense and a nuisance for Glen residents. You can help to delay this nightmare by removing vines from your fences and clearing dirt and debris out from under them to allow drainage. Excess dirt and plant debris can be spread under trees and bushes.

Co-owners and residents are responsible for keeping their patio areas clean. For more information about patios in the Glen, please see the article on the next page (page 4) of this newsletter.



Important Patio Reminders

Spring is here, and your backyard patio is calling your name. Whether grilling, entertaining, or relaxing outside, you'll find your own patio provides the perfect spot. And this is a great time to remind you about the do's and don'ts of patios in the Glen.

Co-owners and residents must keep their patio areas clean, neat, orderly, and free from obstructions or accumulation of personal property other than patio furniture. The Glen assumes no liability for loss or damage to articles stored in or on the patios and is not responsible for damage to anything built, placed, or planted in the patio area except when such damage was caused by the gross negligence of Glen employees and/or Glen contractors performing maintenance.

HOT TUBS: Hot tubs are not permitted in patios.

LANDSCAPING WITHIN PATIOS: Co-owners and residents may landscape within their fenced enclosures provided it does not impact adjacent units and does not violate Glen policy.

PATIO TREES: Patio trees, along with other trees throughout the Glen, help to beautify our neighborhood. They provide shade for humans, homes for birds, and contribute to a healthy environment.

Please remember, however, that patio trees are the responsibility of the co-owner to maintain, including trimming and removal when appropriate. Branches should not touch roofs, gutters, or buildings and should not interfere with other common elements such as tennis courts. Trunks and roots should not intrude into your neighbor's yard or common elements or push against fences. If they do, you will be required to remove a patio tree at your expense.



When planting new trees in patios, we urge you to consider small trees whose eventual size is scaled for small areas like our patios rather than mighty oaks or maples, which are better suited for more open areas. Some trees that are appropriate for patios include: Deciduous Magnolia, Star or Gem Magnolia, Eastern Redbud (in many color varieties), Serviceberry, Mountain Laurel (can be grown as a small tree), Crepe Myrtle, Red Spruce, Plum, River Birch, Kousa Dogwood, Bald Cypress, Styrax, and Japanese Maple.

PATIO STRUCTURES (Blanket Variance): No structures shall be placed or constructed inside the patios that exceed the height of patio fences, and structures may not be attached to patio fences. Table umbrellas, trees, and shrubs may exceed the fence height. Hanging plants must be below the fence line except those hanging from rear door canopies.

UNDERGROUND DRAINAGE: This is the responsibility of the co-owner or resident to monitor and keep clear all underground drainage devices attached to the downspouts in the patio areas. Failure to do so will block your downspout and cause the gutter to overflow. Your neighbor could also be affected, and you would be responsible for any damage.

VINES: Vines are not permitted on buildings or fences. Vines or plants may be placed on trellises within the patio area. Trellises are not to exceed fence height.

Please take the time to inspect your patio area and make sure you are in compliance. Go ahead and trim those trees, shrubs, and vines.

Reminder - Glen's Tot Lot Closes at Dusk

Users of the Glen's tot lot shall adhere to good neighbor rules. Please note:



- Young children should be supervised and not left unattended.
- Playing at the tot lot ceases at dusk.
- The tot lot is located behind homes in Courts 9, 10, and 15. Therefore we ask parents and children using the playground to be mindful of the neighbors in terms of noise. And there is to be no music from any source.
- For the safety of everyone, gravel should remain in the tot lot.

Important B Building Reminders

B Building hallways have been given a fresh update with paint, flooring & carpeting, and lighting, so it's a perfect time to remind all co-owners and residents about the common areas of our B Buildings.

Common Front Door - The common front door may not be left open since this is against the Arlington County Fire Code and has the potential to admit rodents.

Common Hallway Mailbox - Larger mailboxes were installed in 2011. Please do not let "junk mail" accumulate in the common hallway because this can give the appearance to a potential burglar that people are not home.

Common Hallway Lights & Smoke Detectors - If you notice a hallway light has burned out or is flickering, call or email the onsite staff. Give them the building's address and state the location of the problem. The smoke detectors were just replaced with 10-year battery models. If you notice a problem with a smoke detector, please contact the onsite staff immediately. Do not remove the battery yourself; it is against the law and puts you and your neighbors in danger.

Common Hallway Smoking - Smoking in the hallways is not allowed. It is a fire hazard, leaves an unpleasant odor, will eventually stain the walls, and can create problems for those who are allergic to smoke. Smokers are strongly encouraged to either smoke inside their units or outside the building. Please do not throw butts in common areas.

Common Hallway & Basement Storage - Only bicycles, tricycles, and baby carriages are allowed in the common hallways and basements, and only if all residents in the building agree and the items do not block access to exits. Some limit on the number of such items may be imposed. Nothing is to be affixed to hallway or basement walls. Please note that towels should never be left hanging over the railings.

Inside Common Hallway Door - The common hallway door leading to the lower level is to be kept locked at all times. Every unit in the building should have a key because upper residents may need to access their main water cutoff, which is located in the basement.

Noise - Noise can easily carry between both lower and upper units. If you have a noise problem with a neighbor, the following suggestions should help to alleviate it:

- Replace floor padding with heavy, sound absorbent padding.
- Replace carpeting with thicker carpeting
- Put padding under washers and dryers.
- Line the front door frame with felt that has gum backing to prevent the door from slamming.
- Use furniture and wall hangings to absorb noise.
- Take measures to ensure animals are not loud as to create a disturbance to another unit.

New Deputy Chief of Police Appointed

Arlington Parks & Rec Cancels Summer Programs

- Summer Creative Playgroup

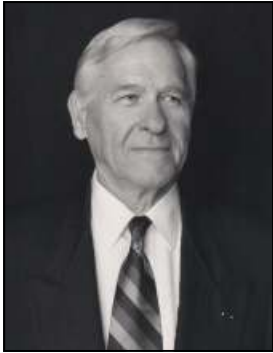


Regarding summer camps, the County will continue to monitor both national and state guidance to determine what they can provide, with a decision coming in early May.

The Glen Remembers

Two former Glen volunteers have recently passed away. Here we offer our remembrance.



Hal Vorhies

Hal Vorhies, a Court 3 co-owner in Fairlington Glen since 1995, passed away on April 18 at the age of 89. He was a Colonel in the US Army (Ret.), focused on military intelligence, retiring from active duty in 1983.

Hal joined the Glen's Board of Directors in 1995 and served for three years. His major, and significant, achievement was a successful installation of our current patio fences. Because Hal was a hard taskmaster, the Board was able to enforce contract terms, especially those relating to the ground depth of support posts. Those 1997 fences, with repairs handled by onsite staff, have now lasted beyond the original estimate of 20 years.

Another of Hal's accomplishments was creation of the first Fairlington townhouse combining A-2 (Barcroft) and B-2 (Braddock) units into a single home. A lightning strike had destroyed the asbestos roof and water had damaged both units. Hal was able to purchase them in 1995.

For legal purposes, the units allow for separate entrances, can be converted to their original footprints, and pay two separate condo fees. The top level was designed to expose the original brick and beams, topping off Hal's grand townhouse.

Services at Arlington National Cemetery will be planned at a later date. An obituary can be found in the April 26, 2020 *Washington Post*.

Marge and Frank Angelo were co-owners in Court 8 of the Glen from Feb. 1987 until Feb. 2009. Sadly, Marge died on April 13 at their home near Pottsville, PA.

Marge was the Court Rep or Alternate Court Rep for Court 8 from 1987 to 2006 and Chairperson for Buildings & Grounds Committee from March 1996 to Nov. 2002 and Vice-Chairperson of the Buildings & Grounds Committee/Court Representatives Group from March 2005 to Jan. 2006. Even after retiring from office, Marge assisted with gathering proxies for our Annual Meeting. Marge and two others revised the Fairlington Glen Handbook in 1999, a major undertaking, and Frank Angelo typed the master copy of that Handbook.

Marge was a kindergarten or first grade teacher at St. Rita's Catholic School in Alexandria for 22 years when they lived here and prior to that she taught in Wisconsin and various military bases in Italy, Turkey, Labrador, and the United States.

Marge was buried at Indiantown Gap National Cemetery in Annville, PA.

Email Scammers Target Board President

The Glen Board has recently seen an uptick in scammers attempting to reach out via false email addresses while impersonating Board President Charlie Robbins and possibly other volunteer members of our community.

These messages normally come from randomly created email addresses, but the name descriptor is changed to “Charlie Robbins,” which at a quick glance can make the messages appear legitimate. However, please don’t be fooled.



The Board will never ask anyone to purchase gift cards or anything else and will never supply personal information through email.

The best thing to do if you get one of these false messages is to simply delete it. Unfortunately, there is not much follow up that can be done due to the anonymity of the web. Most of the recent messages have asked the receiver to purchase gift cards and have referenced supporting veterans and the current COVID-19 relief efforts.

Face Masks Help to Limit Spread of COVID-19



Arlington County is encouraging all Arlingtonians to wear cloth face coverings when in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain.

This directive is in accordance with a recommendation from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which encourages the cloth face coverings in public (e.g. grocery stores and pharmacies).

To be clear, this is not meant as a replacement to staying at home, hand-washing or maintaining six feet of distance – those remain the cornerstones in the effort to slow the spread of the Coronavirus.

Why Do You Need To Wear a Mask? There is now evidence that people with Coronavirus can transmit it to others before showing symptoms (“asymptomatic” or “pre-symptomatic”). The use of a cloth face covering can help to slow the spread, particularly among those who have the virus and do not know it. To be clear, the cloth face covering is to protect people around you if you are infected but do not have symptoms.

What Type of Cloth Face Covering Should be Worn? The suggested cloth face coverings, fashioned from household items or made at home from common materials, are not surgical masks or N-95 respirators – those are critical supplies needed by healthcare workers and other medical first responders. The CDC offers three types of cloth face coverings for use: 1) sewn cloth face covering, 2) quick-cut t-shirt face covering (no sew method), and 3) bandana face covering (no sew method).

All cloth face coverings should:

- fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face
- be secured with ties or ear loops
- include multiple layers of fabric
- allow for breathing without restriction
- be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to shape

Fox Tests Positive for Rabies

Two separate incidents occurred on Saturday April 25, 2020, in the North Fairlington in which a fox attacked and injured two domestic cats.

Animal Control responded to the 2800 block of S. Columbus Street in Arlington on Saturday April 25th in the afternoon in response to a call about a fox attacking a domestic cat. Shortly thereafter, another call came in regarding an additional cat being attacked by a fox in close vicinity. Animal Control officers were unable to locate the suspect fox at that time.

On Sunday April 26th, Animal Control responded in the morning and retrieved a deceased fox in the 4800 block of 27th Road S. in Arlington. This fox was sent for testing and confirmed to be positive for rabies.



The Animal Welfare League of Arlington (AWLA) is actively working on a multifaceted approach to reduce the risk to the public and prevent future incidents. It is important that the community stay alert at this time.

Animal Control requests that any fox sightings in the common areas of this community or encroaching on the property in any way be reported immediately. Foxes are known to carry rabies, so any interaction with them (person or pet) should be reported immediately to Animal Control.

Animal Control is reachable directly 24/7-365 days a year at 703-931-9241.

Dogs, cats, and other domestic pets should be kept inside or on leash at all times. Children should be supervised at all times when outside. Do not feed or approach any wild, stray, or feral animals, even if they appear friendly or injured. Please make sure your dogs and cats are up-to-date on their rabies vaccinations.

If you believe you or a member of your family may have had contact with any wild animal, including a fox, please contact the Arlington County Department of Human Services, Nurse of the Day at 703-228-5200, option 1.
